Picturing the future of Humboldt power

If it weren't for the colorful mural painted on one of its gray, rectangular buildings, Humboldt Bay Power Plant (HBPP) would easily blend in with the surrounding landscape.

Featuring images of actual events and workers from the plant's past and present, the mural was commissioned by Director and Plant Manager Paul Roller as a creative and engaging way to tell the HBPP story. "I wanted to capture the unique culture of HBPP." Roller said, "so the people of the plant could see where we've been, where we're at, and how we're all headed in the same direction."

The mural was conceived as a timeline, depicting the early days of nuclear power in black and white. Following a transmission pipe image through the mural, the viewer sees the removal of the plant's transformers, a tribute to the efforts of grassroots safety teams that led the "Plus 1" initiative, and the installation of the engines for the new Humboldt Bay Generating Station (HBGS). The timeline concludes with an image of the Nuclear Regulatory Committee's license flying away—symbolic of the ultimate decommissioning of the plant. The focal point of the artwork is a torch being handed off as the old power plant is shut down and HBGS comes online.

It's a lot to take in, but the mural conveys how much activity happens on this small site. The turbines, spent fuel pool racks and reactor head have all been removed. but crews continue to dismantle the old facility: At the same time, employees are manning the new facility and simultaneously preparing for future environmental remediation on the old site.

"I like to say that this is the busiest 13 acres in the state of California," Roller said.

The plant's culture places a heavy emphasis on safety. Roller himself wears a badge that says, "Tell Me" encouraging others to speak up and let him know if he is being unsafe. Even the mural's artist, Jerry Lee Wallace, had to get used to wearing a harness while painting above ground. "I admit I balked at first." Wallace said. "But I was very impressed with the safety around here."

As the plant changes from HBPP to HBGS, the culture of safety and operational excellence remains constant. HBGS delivers power to 67,809 homes and businesses, and the employees who operate it will have the mural to remind them to continue the tradition of delivering safe and reliable energy to our customers.

Lujan said that two PG&E grants totaling \$10,000 to the Capital Region Chapter of the American Red Cross supplied

PG&E's successful 2010 Coats 4 Kids drive collected over 6,000 items of warm clothing which have been donated to 57 different locations across our service territory. Agencies that received clothing items include Habitat for Humanity, homes for abused

food, blankets, cots and other necessities serving customers at shelters in the Twain Harte area and in the town of Arnold. Both sites set up as warming centers (which usually close at 5 p.m.) transitioned to overnight shelters Wednesday through Friday.

The shelter at Word of Life Fellowship in Mi Wuk Village (Twain Harte) served more than 40 meals, plus a Thanksgiving dinner that fed 75 residents, volunteers and firefighters.

At the Ebbetts Pass Fire Department in Arnold, more than 30 meals were served over the two-day period.
