The Little Town That Could

Once there was a town on the Carquinez Strait brimming with life as a major grain port between Crockett and Martinez in west Contra Cost County. The Solano and Contra Costa—the two largest ferries in the world—steamed to Benicia and back past sailing ships, warehouses, saloons and hotels on waterfront wharves. At the peak of the grain season, the town was home to more than 3,000 inhabitants—mostly sailors, stevedores and railroaders.

other small shops; and along the waterfront, there is the Port Costa School. In 1989, the Port Costa Conservation Society bought the building from the local school district because it is the only public building in Port Costa.

"It's really important, because people forget their history and therefore keep repeating their mistakes," said Dee Stewart, treasurer of the Conservation Society.

When the school was purchased, its floors had holes everywhere; the roof was warped and the windows broken. Over the past 23 years, Dee and her husband, Lewis, have been rebuilding the school.

"All the work we do is pro bono," Lewis said. "We have put in thousands of hours over the years in the work that we do. It's a good fit for both of us; Dee was an accountant and bookkeeper and worked with a construction outfit, so she's very familiar with the requirements of construction. My contribution is in communication. When I worked for PG&E, I was a photographer and writer and worked for company publications and the website. So for me, it's a continuation of what I used to do.'

Lewis and other volunteers do the manual labor. They've had to trench for new foundations and have installed huge steel beams. The process requires engineering and architectural drawings, and of course, money.

"We get a lot of donations. I'd say 80 percent of the engineering on the building has been pro bono work," Dee explained. "You fall in love with the building when you see it. When I came to this town, I fell in love with the school because I went to a small school, and when I had a chance to give back to the community and help out, I took on the challenge."

Lewis writes a quarterly four-page newsletter that goes out to everyone in town and to the Port Costa Conservation Society. It features information about work on the school, the improvements, donations and contributions so people can share in the restoration process as it happens.

There are a couple of fundraisers and a car show every year at the school; this year the show is on August 4. It's small but very popular, selling out each year. Lewis and Dee said that they see everything from vintage Model T's to some late-model cars and '50s Fords and Chevys. The rules are simple: any model, any year, any make is welcome, as long as it can be driven through the gate.

School reconstruction should happen in the near future. "The goal is to have the school in good shape and safe so we're able to use it as a community center," Lewis said of the historic site, which turned 100 last year. "I didn't think we'd see it being used when we first started, but it's already being used on a very limited basis."

A Silicon Valley company, IDEO, recently rented the school for team-building training and afterwards had dinner at the Bull Valley Roadhouse restaurant.

"They had an incredibly good time," Dee said, "and that is what we want to see happen for the school, this kind of usage. We're all just so thrilled they had such a good time. We are starting to get a lot of inquiries about weddings at the school. It's just an amazing building. We call it the miniature White House. It's a labor of love."

UC Merced Thanks PG&E for Benefits of School of Engineering Partnership

The University of California, Merced (UC Merced) honored PG&E with its inaugural Vanguard Award to thank the utility for its \$1 million donation to the School of Engineering.

The honor is a special one since it's the first awarded by the Vanguard, a collection of student presidents of the campus' nine engineering organizations, including groups dedicated to women engineers, robotics and biomedicine.

PG&E President Chris Johns accepted the award during a seminar of senior engineering students at UC Merced, which became the 10th and newest University of California campus in 2005. The school's top administrators, students and city and county officials also attended.

Chris said PG&E was proud to receive the award knowing that PG&E's involvement is so important to Merced.

"This school means a lot to the state and to the community," Chris said. "It provides a lot of vitality to this area. And it means a lot to the Central Valley because this is now a place where the great minds are being developed that will be the leaders of the future."

'Transform the education experience'

School of Engineering Dean Dan Hirleman, who presented the award along with senior mechanical engineering student and Vanguard President Mark Lazarro, said the partnership with PG&E is a gift for students and the San Joaquin Valley.

PG&E grant created opportunities

PG&E has provided more than \$80 million in grants since 2001 for education and to organizations for environmental and general community purposes. But the UC Merced contribution, announced in 2007 and ending this year, is one of PG&E's largest donations to any organization in its service area.

The donation expanded the school's Engineering Service Learning Lab, named for PG&E, where students design engineering solutions for hospitals, public TV stations, blood banks and other community partners. Research included developing a new valve used in the intravenous treatment of infant patients in intensive care at Children's Hospital Central California.

Benefits include prototypes, tutoring and more

Students also use the lab as a machine shop to construct prototypes of their projects, as a hub to meet with faculty mentors and to write reports and presentations on the lab's computers. PG&E even assisted one of the student groups—the Society of Automotive Engineers—in a student competition to design and build a Formula race car.

Funds from the grant have supported student projects, tutoring and mentoring programs, a community garden and travel to national conferences for workshops.

But PG&E's aid has been more than financial. The utility hosted a career day to talk to engineering students about jobs at the Diablo Canyon Power Plant. And PG&E provided the school with two natural-gas-powered cars for its fleet.
